## 1. EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

## 1.1 INTRODUCTION

As far as the historical evidence goes, efforts to establish a college in Suri, the headquarters of Birbhum district, started in 1934. But the first significant steps were taken only around 1940.

By then, the World War II had started and in India, Calcutta became the prime target of the Japanese. This caused widespread panic and people started fleeing Calcutta for the neighbouring towns and villages. Thus in search of safety Vidyasagar College Calcutta moved out to Suri. And thus a dream became reality.

On 9th March 1942 the college started its journey as a branch of "Vidyasagar College", Calcutta with 212 students in rented rooms with furniture brought over from Calcutta. By June of the same year, it had already moved into its newly constructed building. After 1948, it became an independent college with the name "Suri Vidyasagar College".

The College has undergone two cycles for accreditation by NAAC, Bangalore; in November 2005 and November 2016, earning grades of "B+" and "B++" respectively. Now, the institution stands tall, spreading the message of knowledge and wisdom to society. Spread over a large area of 25 Bigha, 5 Katha and 8 chatak, the college consists of 21 Academic Departments out of which 18 offer Honours & General courses, 3 General Courses and 1 P.G. Course in Zoology. Currently the total built area is around 5615 sq. mt. which contains classrooms, laboratories, library, office, seminar halls, canteen, Gymnasium and students' hostels( Boys and Girls).

The institute is now a RUSA 2.0 funded institute with developmental work carried out through addition of floorspace, boundary construction and renovation works wherever necessary. The college also prides itself upon its significant percentage of "green zone" and has therefore carefully tried to preserve its natural touch by forsaking unnecessary use of concrete and other artificial beautification.

## 1.2 Strength, Weakness, Opportunity and Challenges(SWOC)

## **Institutional Strength**

- 1. Heritage and reputation: The college's rich history and strong reputation attract students and faculty alike. It is one of the biggest and oldest colleges affiliated to the University of Burdwan and has undergraduate honours courses in most of the traditional subjects alongwith professional honours course in Mass Communication and Journalism, and Microbiology.
- 2. Experienced faculty: Dedicated teachers with a passion for teaching and mentoring. Almost all faculty are NET/SET qualified and several hold PhD degrees.
- 3. Diverse courses: A wide range of undergraduate programs in arts, science and commerce are available. PG program is available in Zoology. The college also offers a certificate course in Drama.
- 4. Strong alumni network: Notable alumni in various fields, including academics, literature, politics, sports and cultural fields.
- 5. Clean and Green campus: A carefully maintained campus with a peaceful atmosphere, conducive to learning. The campus is a ragging-free, no-smoking, plastic-free zone. A large percentage of the total campus area is a green zone.
- 6. Academic excellence: Consistently high pass percentage and ranks in university exams. The Arun Sen Memorial Trust organises an Annual Prize Distribution Ceremony to honour and reward top achievers in curricular, extra-curricular and cultural domains.
- 7. Extracurricular activities: Emphasis on cultural, sports, and social services events, fostering overall student development. The Drama Club organises a drama festival annually in which several departments and faculty members and other staff members take active part.
- 8. Commitment to social responsibility: Outreach programs and community engagement initiatives are practised mainly through NSS and NCC depts that organise blood donation camps, rallies on health, hygiene and social issues, tree plantation drives etc. The three NSS units have adopted five nearby villages (Kubirpur, Gobra, Adda, Chandanpur and Rastanpur).

#### **Institutional Weakness**

- 1. Limited infrastructure: Low ICT facility and inadequate number of classrooms due to change in education policies and course patterns
- 2. Limited resources: Lack of financial autonomy and insufficient funds and resources for research and extracurricular activities.
- 3. Fluctuating student-teacher ratio: Large class sizes, especially in compulsory courses and also a low

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enrolment ratio in some other subjects like Economics and Commerce

- 4. Limited industry connections: Inadequate connections with industries and organizations for internships and job placements.
- 5. Limited institutional autonomy: Lack of autonomy in course structuring, seat addition or reduction, selection norm and procedure are some drawbacks in a rapidly changing, hugely competitive social environment.

## **Institutional Opportunity**

- 1. Growing demand for higher education: Increasing demand for quality education in the region can promote introducing of new subjects and/or PG courses. New certificate courses may also be introduced
- 2. Government initiatives: Government schemes and funding for education and research, if and when available can promote newer thinking
- 3. Collaborations and partnerships: Potential for collaborations with industries, organizations, and international institutions. More MOU's may be entered into for faculty exchange
- 4. Online education: Opportunity to expand online diploma or certificate courses and reach a wider audience.
- 5. Community engagement: Further potential for community outreach and engagement programs with help of NSS and NCC departments.

### **Institutional Challenge**

- 1. Competition: Increasing competition from private colleges and universities (with greater academic, financial and advertising freedom) and also vocational and professional courses
- 2. Funding constraints: Limited government funding and grants and also inability to generate funds under current rules and regulations
- 3. Changing regulations: Frequent changes in education policies and regulations that can create uncertainty in students' and guardians' minds
- 4. Economic downturn: Economic recession impacting student enrollment and funding especially after the Covid pandemic
- 5. Global pandemics: Disruptions caused by pandemics, such as COVID-19 that hugely impact the social sphere

By acknowledging these strengths, weaknesses, opportunities, and challenges Suri Vidyasagar College can strategically enhance its infrastructure, resources, industry connections, and online presence, ultimately improving its reputation and academic excellence.

## 1.3 CRITERIA WISE SUMMARY

## **Curricular Aspects**

Currently the college has 21 academic subjects of which 18 offer Honours courses and 3 General Courses of study. Regular PG course is offered in the department of Zoology. The college also offers 4 PG courses of the

DDE, Bardhaman University. The college houses a NSOU Study Centre from January 1998.

Besides these the college has entered into faculty exchange with other similar institutions and several MOU's (20 in number) have been signed and implemented.

The college encourages self development of all faculty members by allowing them to pursue PhD programs and other such courses regularly. Refresher courses, orientation programmes and attending and presenting papers in conferences and seminars is encouraged. Besides various faculty members are part of the Board of Studies and other such bodies of various colleges and University.

The college with the help of the IQAC encourages all departments to develop teaching plans and implement them rigourously. For this an Academic Calendar is published at the beginning of each academic session providing a roadmap for expected activities. The Covid-19 crisis saw alternative and online modes of teaching such as use of Google classroom, Google meet, supply of recorded audio lectures and study material in PDF form. Field studies, excursions, educational tours, village surveys etc are encouraged. Innovative teaching learning is encouraged through student seminars, science exhibition, quiz etc. The college has a feedback system by which learners are encouraged to provide their opinion regarding modes and methods of study and other related issues.

## **Teaching-learning and Evaluation**

The college strives to provide quality education which not only allows the students to achieve academic excellence but also make them socially responsible. The college website provides relevant up to date information regarding admission criteria, admission process, departmental information, rules and regulations, study material and other extension services. During the last 5 years an average of 1800 students have been admitted of which a significant section belonged to SC, ST, OBC and PwD categories. The college follows a detailed academic calendar with teaching plan and syllabus distribution being made known to students. Upon admission students are placed under a mentor who looks after their academic progress and provides regular counselling. The college utilises various innovative teaching and learning methods and ICT tools to enhance the learning experience. In the last five years 20 MOU's have been entered into with similar institutions for faculty exchange and specialised lectures. Periodic internal assessments are also taken in form of class tests, viva voce, seminar, home assignments etc. The evaluation system is honest, transparent, time bound and efficient. The Institute has defined program outcomes and course outcomes for each program and course for which direct and indirect methodologies are utilised to assess the outcome. The annual Arun Sen Memorial Prize distribution ceremony aims at bettering academic performance by awarding the best performers with memorial prizes for all academic disciplines and some co curricular, extra curricular and cultural activities.

### Research, Innovations and Extension

## **Research & Innovations:**

The college encourages and supports research work by its faculty members in letter and spirit and makes the best efforts to provide adequate infrastructure to its faculty members for carrying out research work.

- 1) The Central Library houses has several reference books and subscribes to many research journals
- 2) The college has a Research and Publication subcommittee that encourages faculty to apply for Major and Minor research projects
- 3) Currently 39 number of total faculty holds PhD degree
- 4) The institute through RUSA funds have modernised and updated Laboratory and Library resources
- 5) Over the last 5 years 136 research articles has been published in UGC listed and UGC CARE listed journals

and many have been published in journals with Impact factors

- 6) Our faculty have published 58 books as well as chapters in books
- 7) The college has entered into MOU's (20 in number) with similar institutions for learning and research promotion
- 8) The college has organized 53 seminars/ conferences/ endowment lectures on various topics including research methodology and IPR
- 9) Four of our senior faculty members are acting as Research Guide. 17 scholars have been registered under their guidance for Ph.D. programme and 10 of them have been awarded their degree. Others are perusing under their constant supervision.

#### **Extensions:**

Extension has been done mainly through the NSS and NCC units. Various activities such as blood donation, AIDS awareness, Pollution Week, health and hygiene, tree plantation, environmental awareness etc in oncampus and off-campus locations have been organised. The three NSS units have adopted five local villages (Gobra, Rastanpur, Chandanpur, Adda and Kubirpur) and contribute towards spreading social awareness and upliftment.

The college regularly organises book exhibitions and an annual science exhibition benefitting not only its own students but also students of some local schools.

The Drama Club stages plays on relevant social topics to spread awareness and contribute towards social betterment.

In the period of pandemic, a Covid Vaccationation Camp was organized at our college premises by NSS unit to vaccinate our students during 28th & 29th September 2021.

Boys (150 in number) of the NCC units were requisitioned by Birbhum district police for deployment in queue and traffic management during "Durga Puja" festival under Suri PS and Suri Police Lines wef 03.10.2019 - 12.10.2019 @ Rs 480/cadet/day.

## **Infrastructure and Learning Resources**

## Category-4:

The college is spread over in area covering 11.19 acres of which 1915 sq. mt. is built up area that contains the administrative office, science building, classrooms, Humanities building, laboratories, Aurobindo Bhawan, Gandhi Bhaban, girls hostel, boys hostel, canteen, gymnasium, post office, bank, NSOU study centre, college quarters and play field for sports and games. There are three green generators and the whole campus is under CCTV surveillance (since 2014) that is regularly modernized.

The college has three NSS and 2 NCC units, Drama Club, Electoral Literacy Club etc

There are 71 classrooms including 20 well equipped laboratories. Provision has been made for using ICT on a shared basis with eleven classrooms including seminar hall being fitted with LCD projector for ICT based teaching learning, PPT presentation and use of multimedia content. The Language Lab, inaugurated by the President of India in 2012, contains LCD projector and as many as 15 computers with necessary software. High speed broadband facility including wifi has been provided in most part of the college office, teachers room, reading room, zoology department etc.

The Central Library stands over 363.34 square metres and houses 62,235 books. It also subscribes to 8 printed journals, 3 periodicals, 4 newsappers and 15 e-newspapers. It is automated with integrated library management

system (KOHA). Catalogue of the library may also be accessed online and details of availability, number of copies and edition information known.

The college also has a large playground for field sports, separate basketball court and a gymnasium equipped with general equipment. Games like chess, khokho, kabaddi etc are also promoted.

### **Student Support and Progression**

Students are the nerve centre of any educational institution and the reputation of the said institution depends upon their welfare and well being. Suri Vidyasagar College tries its best to ensure that no student has to leave studies midway due to any problem arising out of college related issues. For this an overall healthy environment (literally and figuratively) is preserved. More than 47 % of students get various government scholarships. Mentoring and Counselling services are provided. Soft skills, life skills and overall communication skills are prioritised. Yoga is encouraged and self defence training provided for female students. During the covid-19 pandemic blood donation camp, vaccination camp, webinar on stress management and psychological health were organised. The college observes various important days like Anti tobacco day, Women's Day, Teachers Day, Human Rights Day, Swachh Bharat Abhiyan campaign etc. Clubs such as electoral literacy club, drama club, red ribbon club etc strive to inspire students to shine in their preferred fields of activity. The college regularly organises the annual Sports and takes part in district as well as university level Sports. The record of this college at Youth Parliament competitions and debate and extempore competitions is enviable. There is a student grievance redressal cell that actively looks into any issues that may arise from time to time. The campus is kept ragging free and the Vishaka guidelines strictly enforced. Students take part in annual students seminar and annual science exhibition. Meritorious students as well as prominent achievers are rewarded through prizes by the Arun Sen Memorial Trust. The college looks after the employability of its students and the TCS-YEP is held regularly. The Mahindra group has also organised an employment program for deserving female candidates. Besides, students are encouraged to take part in competitive exams through seminars held upon the same. This college has a registered Alumni Association which takes part in the development of the college. Its a matter of pride that many of our Alumni are the leading lights of many national and international organisations and institution, as well as having occupied the highest constitutional office in India.

## Governance, Leadership and Management

Suri Vidyasagar College aligns its mission and vision with national policies on higher education, focusing on nation building and social reform. The Governing Body is the apex body and takes all policy decisions. The Principal is the chief executive functionary in academic, administrative and financial affairs. The teaching faculty and non teaching staff impart cooperation through different subcommittees formed by the GB and assists in the management of the college. The IQAC has taken a lead role in quality assurance and enhancement since its formation on 2006.

Leadership and a spirit of service to humanity is inculcated within the students through different curricular and extracurricular activities such as NCC, NSS, Sports, Cultural activities, Career Counselling and Placement services and other welfare schemes.

The institute has implemented e-governance in fields of administration, finance, student admissions, scholarships and examinations. Teaching faculty are encouraged to take up self advancement through PhD, Orientation and Refresher programs, short term courses, seminars and conferences etc. Faculty and student

exchange are encouraged through MOU's with other institutions. Annual self-appraisal system is used for performance evaluation of faculty. Efforts are made to secure funds from the UGC, RUSA, DST, MLA Grant, Govt departments and others. The institute's accounts are audited regularly. The IQAC takes initiatives to conduct Academic Audit and collects feedback from all stakeholders and makes necessary recommendations.

#### **Institutional Values and Best Practices**

The college accords utmost importance to its mission and vision and wishes to perform a socially productive role by empowering learners to be worthwhile citizens of the largest democracy that India is. For this the college academic calendar not only records important curricular activity but also observation of the birth and death anniversaries of important persons and social luminaries. The college gives priority to campaigns to raise awareness on issues of gender and environment. Gender Audit and gender sensitization workshops are conducted. The college campus is a strictly ragging free zone and girls students are also given training in self defence. The college takes the issue of environment seriously and has its own green policy as well as performs green audit. The college has around 40% of Green zone that is preserved with atmost care and a biodiversity checklist carefully maintained. Utilisation of solar power, rainwater harvesting, enabling groundwater recharge, use of LED lamps etc are given priority. Waste management is done as per rule with proper segregation and disposal. The college is under CCTV surveillance for better security and the libraries, enriched with 62,235 books and 11 printed journals & periodicals, is automated with KOHA software that enables online access of catalogue. In short, the institute wishes to ensure affordable holistic education to all in an atmosphere that promotes the best physical, moral and intellectual development.

## **Institutional preparedness for NEP**

1. Multidisciplinary/interdisciplinary:

A uni-dimensional approach cannot be the ideal pathway to learning in today's world and multidisciplinary/interdisciplinary approach is the need of the hour. Thus has gained importance the of re-vamping education and restructuring the learning. Hence has been born the contemporary method to empower the leaders of tomorrow, because new times require newer approaches. We believe in learning by doing, learning by living and learning by designing. This would mean taking a holistic approach, combining multiple disciplines to achieve one common purpose. The fundamental aim is the allround development of a learner so that he/she can cope with the situations to be encountered in course

of the rest of his/her life. It will strengthen critical thinking skills, resulting in a deeper understanding and assimilation of knowledge. Apart from selfcultivation and critical thinking, it will create motivation to explore new interests. Thus it would heighten creativity, which in turn will nurture learners capacity to come up with innovative solutions to modern issues. Thus it would help the learner to gain a deeper understanding of the world around us. The twenty first century has witnessed revolutionary development in the realm of knowledge and its applications throughout the globe. Keeping these in mind and being guided by NEP 2020 the college within its limited scope has initiated to cater holistic and multidisciplinary education to its students with a view to inculcating the multifarious arenas of knowledge and its applications in the socio academic, socio-economic and socio cultural fields. The affiliating university i.e., the University of Burdwan under which this college runs, has introduced Multidisciplinary / interdisciplinary curriculum for the three streams: Arts, Commerce & Science. Our students are provided the scope to undergo need based courses simultaneously under the choice based credit system (CBCS) incorporating language and humanities courses, natural science courses, Biological Science courses, Commerce courses and environmental science: both theoretical and practical applications and even specialized education is provided through the discipline specific subjects under these studies. It is observed that not only the theoretical knowledge but also its application and skill enhancement on the basis of that has been focused. In addition, extracurricular and co curricular courses, sports, NCC, NSS, cultural activities etc. offered by the college in order to transform the students into a proper human resource force, is the prime need of the day. College has introduced new four years Major Programme in Physical Education and sports with effect from 2023-24 Academic year.

2. Academic bank of credits (ABC):

The Academic Bank of Credit, a part of the NEP 2020, aims to create before the learners the opportunity of multiple entry and exit options in both UG and PG courses. This opportunity will certainly help them to overcome the hurdles during the particular course of study or moving to another one.

They can now take an exit for the time being and can again resume the course at his/ her convenience. The Universty of Burdwan initiated the implementation of ABC. Our college also has tried to keep pace with this learner-centric initiative.

## 3. Skill development:

Skill development is an integral component of increasing sound academics development. Theoretical knowledge in itself is limited and cannot make a man complete and competent to undertake the responsibility in both formal and informal career. In order to make the learners competent to utilize their acquired knowledge in their career, Skill development as a part of the curriculum is extremely necessary. Presently college follows the CBCS based curriculum where skill enhancement courses (two SEC for the Honours students and four SEC for the General students) have been made compulsory for the learners. These courses have been developed based on utility principles. The courses cover applied aspects of the knowledge concerned. This is expected to equip our students with appropriate hands-on skills, which will increase their employability. Moreover, as mentioned earlier extracurricular and cocurricular activities are also carried out with a view to developing among the learners the skills to make them competent in several spheres of their lives. College has already signed MOU's with several organizations for skill development of our students. We also provide support to develop skill through Physical education and sports committee. Our college regularly takes part in various men and women events in university and DPI sports and received awards in several categories. College has introduced 4 years Major Programme in Physical Education and sports to extend the facility of games and sports among the students.

4. Appropriate integration of Indian Knowledge system (teaching in Indian Language, culture, using online course):

In order to integrate Indian knowledge systems with items taught, courses offered under the CBCS system include the teaching of Indian History, the political system, sociological and cultural heritage, teaching of Bengali and Sanskrit as both Honours and General subjects. Even in the course of Biological courses, India's rich biodiversity has been covered. Moreover, the medium of instruction in most of the UG courses excluding the language ones are offered with the vernacular medium. It is to promote the long and lasting Indian heritage to strengthen indigenous

	knowledge system as well as Indian linguistic system.
5. Focus on Outcome based education (OBE):	The presently running CBCS based curriculum has been developed mainly to give concrete shape of the acquired knowledge. Hence this curriculum comprises core courses of the specific discipline, AECCs and SECs which together will contribute to the outcome based education policy. In each and every course offered in this college, learners are expected to acquire specific areas of knowledge of the concerned discipline following the very objectives mentioned at the beginning of each course. In order to fulfill this, teachers along with the college authority undertake the academic efforts following the guidelines of the curriculum as well as the aims of education.
6. Distance education/online education:	In the first part of the academic session, following the instruction of the Government and the concerned university, college conducted online education in order to ensure preparedness whenever and wherever feasible. Measures such as online classes, digital repositories, student support through online, online examination are already in practice. The Institution runs one Open University (NSOU) and one Distance learning Centre (BU) successfully.

Teachers encourage students' participation in extracurricular activities like quiz competition, debate, extempore speech and Youth Parliament Competition (YPC). Teachers often use PowerPoint Presentations and recommend students to do so as well. Teachers at SVC believe in free thinking which is one of the primary purposes of higher studies. In this regard, students are advised to engage in group discussion, role-play, subject quiz, news analysis and other problem-solving tools. Workshops on drama, yoga and photography are arranged to give students hands-on training in these fields. Teachers at SVC believe that only theoretical knowledge is not enough to nurture the creative faculties of the students. Students are, therefore, motivated to partake in training, placement and career-counselling programs to pave the way for their professional advancement. The Department of Microbiology organizes visits to corporate or industrials houses. Several departments such as the departments of Geography, Botany, Zoology and Plant Protection organize field trips as an integral part of their curricula respectively. Suri Vidyasagar College has 11 ICT facilitated rooms, 87 computers including laptops. Zoology Department has a museum that contains a huge collection of preserved animal species ranging from Protozoa to Mammalia. The college publishes a magazine regularly; along with this, departmental wall magazines help nurture the creative urge of the students. SVC conducts different add-on courses on drama, aquarium management and yoga. During the pandemic period, the needs of the students were particularly taken care of through online classes, doubt-clearing classes, special classes and personal phone calls. Apart from the academic issues, teachers at SVC have always been extra careful regarding the nonacademic and personal problems of the students.

# 2.5.1

Mechanism of internal/ external assessment is transparent and the grievance redressal system is time-bound and efficient

**Response:** 

Teachers atSuri Vidyasagar College focus on theneedfor continuous assessment of the students' progress. Though most of the evaluation methods are decided by the affiliating university, the college tries to apply certain innovative approaches within the scope of the university rules and regulations. Teachers of the college never compromiseon the sanctity of the entire evaluation process. Before the introduction of the CBCS, SVC had a unique best practice called Base Level Test (BLT) which was aimed at understanding the standard of the new students so that they could be taught in a more personalized way. However, in the new CBCS structure since 2017, 20% marks are reserved for internal assessment. Students are made aware of their syllabus, question pattern, marks division and the mechanism of internal and external examination right from the outset through induction meeting, mentormentee meeting and orientation classes. The college publishes its own academic calendar each year following the university calendar and students get to know about the tentative dates of the commencement and completion of internal tests, class tests, special classes and tutorials. Teachers motivate students to attend the classes regularly and conduct surprise tests at times to track the real progress of the students. Principal, Teachers, IQAC and other Academic Sub-committees talk to the students regularly to know about their problems and they also take note of the same. In Parent-Teacher Meeting (PTM), teachers talk to the guardians regarding the performance of the students. Suri Vidyasagar College has a dedicated examination cell that not only conducts all the university examinations but also maintains the inviolability of the university rules. While the internal assessment methods at Suri Vidyasagar College are flexible as endorsed by the affiliating university, they are meant to facilitate the overall progress of the concerned students. Class test, surprise test, notetaking, MCQ test, analytical test, home assignment, case study, classroom presentation, project with viva and many other methods of evaluation are followed by the teachers to keep the internal evaluation process dynamic. All the grievances of the students, including the ones related to examinations, are taken seriously. In this regard, The Grievance Redressal Cell and RTI Cell are active round the clock.

## **Response:**

Although the syllabi of different subjects are framed by the affiliating university, Program Outcomes (POs) and Course Outcomes (COs) are drawn up by the respective departments of Suri Vidyasagar College. Program Outcomes are about the long-term advancement of the students, especially what they achieve at the end of the program in terms of domain knowledge, skill-development and grades. Course Outcomes, on the other hand, focus on the specific and short-term progress of the students. These two indicators are, therefore, closely related. The college strictly follows the rules of the affiliating university

in the implementation of these two goal-based approaches. The teachers of SVC regularly attend seminars, workshops, conferences, webinars and FDPs to keep abreast of the current scenario of their respective disciplines, thereby enriching their students with the knowledge gained from these programs. The college also organizes some of these programs for the benefits of the teachers as well as the students. The outcomes, in both the cases, i.e. POs and COs, are measured through internal test, class test, surprise test, unit test, group discussion, assignment, project, viva voce, interaction and exam result. In case of the add-on courses run by the college, the evaluation is done in an in-house way. Course Outcomes and Program Outcomes are elaborately analyzed in front of the students in different classes and PTMs. The college keeps tracking the progress of the students even after they graduate from the institution in terms of their higher studies and employment. The details of the outcomes are not only recorded and stated, they are also preserved and displayed on the college website.

# **Response:**

Teachers at Suri Vidyasagar College follow a cycle in the attainment of Program Outcomes (POs) and Course Outcomes (COs). First, they explain these methods as clearly as possible to the students. Then they implement these two outcome-based approaches. At the end of each semester, they sit with the students and discuss the outcomes with them. Then their specific problems are raised in the mentormentee meetings and the teachers try to solve them. Finally, they explain the Program Outcomes and Course Outcomes again to the students so that they can get prepared in a better way in future. The college applies the following methods in the evaluation of the attainment of POs and COs:

**Direct Ways of Evaluation:** The level of attainment of both Program Outcomes and Course Outcomes are measured in a fair and objective way. The teachers of Suri Vidyasagar College believe that this evaluation is necessary not only to gauge the performance level of the students but also to know how far they have been able to reach each of the students. Some of the direct ways of outcome evaluation are internal test, surprise test, project, assignment, book review, film review, group discussion, quiz competition and seminar presentation. The affiliating university conducts end-semester exams with the help of the colleges. In university exams, scripts of most of the core courses are evaluated by teachers from other colleges so that neutrality of the evaluation process can be maintained. Under the CBCS system, 20% marks are kept for internal assessment. For example, 5 marks for attendance and 10 marks for internal test are typically reserved in paper of 75 marks. Practical-based subjects have 30% marks for

practical exams so that students can learn application of whatever they learn in an efficient manner. External examiners are appointed by the affiliating university for the assessment of the practical exams.

**Indirect Ways of Evaluation:** There are some indirect ways to evaluate the outcomes as well. It is primarily done through classroom interactions, teachers' feedback and mentors' feedback. Since the deputed mentor for a particular mentee knows about him or her in a deeper way, it becomes easier to know about the true status of progress of that particular student; the mentor even inquires of the students about their social and economic background so that the evaluation is not only just but holistic too. Thus, we can see well that attainment of Program Outcomes (POs) and Course Outcomes (COs) is based on 80% of direct method and 20% of indirect method.

# **Response:**

Suri Vidyasagar College spread across 37,169.10 square meters, stands as a beacon of education, nurturing the academic journey and career advancement of approximately 4,366 students in the academic year 2022-23. The institution boasts a comprehensive infrastructure designed to facilitate a seamless learning process and holistic development. Anchored by essential facilities, the college includes a principal's room, teachers' common room and 9 office rooms that provide administrative support. Specialized spaces like the IQAC room, NSS room, and NCC room underscore the college's commitment to quality education and community engagement.

With 71 classrooms (including 8 ICT-enabled and 3 Smart classrooms, alongside an AC Seminar Hall), a chemical reagent preparation room for chemistry students, dark rooms(lab) for Physics, Mass Communication and Journalism departments, one reading room in library, Suri Vidyasagar College prioritizes modern teaching methodologies and interactive learning environments. Additional amenities such as separate common rooms for girls and boys, a student's union room, one room for alumni and an auditorium cater to diverse student needs and extracurricular activities. The campus also features practical facilities like a gymnasium, basketball ground, open stage for cultural activities, and enhancing the overall student experience.

Maintaining a conducive environment for academic pursuits, the college is equipped with 20 well-equipped laboratories viz. i) physiology (2 nos), ii) Botany (4 nos), iii) Chemistry (5 nos) iv) Physics (4 nos) and v) Zoology lab (1 nos), vi) Plan Protection (1 nos), vii) Microbiology (2 nos), viii) Mass Communication & Journalism (1 nos). These facilities are complemented by a Computer lab, a Mathematics department lab, and widespread computer access across departments, the library, and administrative offices. The library, powered by the automated Koha system, houses a vast collection of 43,097 barcoded books and subscribes to 11 print journals/periodicals. Through the N-LIST platform, students access over 1 lakh e-books and 6,000 e-journals, supported by WEB-OPAC facilities for efficient resource navigation.

Beyond academic infrastructure, Suri Vidyasagar College prioritizes security and convenience with amenities like 4 quarters, 13 washrooms for males, 8 for females and 7 for common use, 48 CCTVs, and 12 AC units for comfort. There is a public adress system to connect with all the stake holders in emeergency. There are 24 fire extinguisher covering labs and campus. It also includes 4 quarters, 7 store rooms and a night guard room. One cycle stand is also available both for faculties and students along

with security guard. The campus-wide Wi-Fi ensures connectivity for educational and administrative purposes, further enhancing the learning ecosystem.

Faculty members are supported with advanced study halls, meeting rooms, and technology resources, empowering them to deliver quality education. The college's commitment to cultural enrichment is evident in its utilization of the open stage for meditation sessions and cultural programs, fostering a vibrant campus community.

In conclusion, Suri Vidyasagar College exemplifies excellence in education infrastructure, providing students with a nurturing environment conducive to academic growth and personal development. By integrating modern facilities with traditional values, the college prepares its students to excel in their chosen fields and contribute meaningfully to society.

# 4.2 Library as a Learning Resource

Library is automated with digital facilities using Integrated Library Management System (ILMS), adequate subscriptions to e-resources and journals are made. The library is optimally used by the faculty and students

## **Response:**

Suri Vidyasagar College Library started along with the establishment of the college in the year 1942 to cater to the academic needs of the faculty, students and staff. The Koha software has been installed in the college library for automation and presently uses version: 22.05.14.000. Koha is a full - featured open-source Library Management software on Linux. The library is fully automated with cloud-based services of Koha (https://svc-opac.softlib.in/). After the books are procured by the library the "Cataloguing" module of Koha is used to process them and generate the search able bibliographic record for proper utilization of the resource. The circulation of the books is computerised and done using the Koha circulation module. The library of college has Online Public Access Catalogue (OPAC) which is accessible to the teachers, students and alumni through library computers as well as WEB-OPAC in 24x7 mode from anywhere.

The college library is a member of the NLIST program of the UGC – INFLIBNET centre (College ID: 1365) for the purpose of accessing the electronic resources. The library users can access e-resources through the library portal (https://svc-opac.softlib.in/) for a directory of open access journals, and actively support OER initiatives by providing resources from platforms such as NPTEL; career-oriented magazines, newspapers, open theses, and dissertations.

At present, the College Library has three Sections. There are sixty-two thousand two hundred and thirty-five (62235) books in the library (up to 2023-24). Besides the books, the College library has a good collection of print journals & periodicals (11 nos. currently), reference books, books written by faculties, books contributed by alumni/ well-wishers. The library subscribes to fifteen e-news papers including career-oriented papers. The library provides other resources such as previous years question papers, list of books available in the library, list of newly arrived books etc. on the college website for its users. The library has a separate shelve that contains a collection of books on Birbhum. There is a book bank in the library.

To promote a diverse range of library events, a significant number of orientation Programmes have beenorganized. We encourage all faculty and students to actively utilize and promote digital literacy by exploring the resources available in the library, like the N-LIST, the NDLIprogram. Book exhibitions are also conducted.

The library has 06 computers with internet facility and free Wi-Fi to access the e-resources. The entire library is under CCTV surveillance. The College is equipped with a Library Sub-committee which acts as an advisory body andhelps in decision making regarding overall development and quality enhancement of library services. The library staffs are always available at the circulation desk and they carry out their duties with utmost dedication and diligence to provide maximum services to the students and Staff of the College. The library has a footfall of around 76 students per day.

## 6.1.1

# **Response:**

The vision of the college is wisdom (jnana), self-sacrifice (tyaga) and social service (seva) as embedded in the college emblem. And the mission of the college is imparting higher education, development of personality and raising socio-cultural awareness. In view of the above vision and mission of the college, it is constantly striving to spread knowledge at the grass root level of the society. Most of the students come from remote rural areas and underprivileged communities. Teachers look forward to helping students with every aspect of their educational needs. Many of our students get opportunities for higher education in various universities and higher educational institutes. Some of our students have also qualified in national level examinations for pursuing higher education after completing their graduation courses from our college. This proves our dominance on the map of higher education in the state. We are always trying to introduce new courses to continue this trend. The college regularly organizes quizzes, student seminars, essay writing competitions and employability skill development programmes. In the COVID situation, teachers have regularly taken classes on online mode. Some webinars are also organized during pandemic on academics, social and cultural and other issues. Keeping in mind the importance of e-learning, the college provides ICT facilitated class rooms to encourage teachers and students to adapt new methods of teaching learning. The laboratory and library have been renovated, expanded and upgraded as per new technology and requirements.

The teachers, Non-teaching staff and students arranged several relief camps helping the villagers in difficult times. Some basic necessity goods have been distributed from these relief camps. The NCC and NSS departments of the college also organize different social awareness programmes to educate the students and local people of the surrounding areas on various social issues.

NEP'20 has been implemented for the UG programme of the college from the Session 2023-24 as per directives of Higher Education Department, W.B. and The University of Burdwan.

Various committees are formed by the Governing Body for smooth functioning of the college. The committees are formed with the teaching and non-teaching members of the college. The members look after the matter entrusted to them. Different policy decisions are taken by the members of the committee after a healthy discussion on the required issues. Unanimous or majority opinion sets forth the decision of the committee. Cultural programmes like college social, freshers welcome and college sports are conducted by the students under the guidance of Teachers.

# **Teaching and Learning**

Academic excellence is the main focus area of the teaching learning process of the institution. The college regularly prepares and follows an academic calendar. The different departments conduct field studies for practical orientation of the students. Educational tours are organised by different departments to enhance the knowledge base of the students. Student seminars are also organised for improving communication skills, gaining expert knowledge and building confidence. Essay writing, debate, and quiz competitions are also conducted for improving all round development of the students.

## **Examination and Evaluation**

Internal tests followed by end semester examinations are conducted every six months to maintain a continuous evaluation process as suggested by CBCS guidelines. For ensuring transparency of evaluation process answer scripts are shown to the students on request.

# **Human Resource Management**

Human Resource Management is an important strategic area of any successful organisation. Keeping this in mind, the college encourages its faculty members and non-teaching staff to develop and grow their

knowledge and skills regularly. Faculty members regularly attend seminars, present papers, participate in orientation/ refresher courses for this purpose. Teachers have completed 64 OP/RC courses and 7 Short Term course; 10 teachers were awarded Ph.D. during the period 2018-19 to 2022-23. Appointments in substantive post are carried out according to the govt. regulation and follow all service rules.

# Library, ICT and Physical infrastructure

The college library is fully automated with KOHA version 22.05.14.000. The library is equipped with 61872 textbooks and reference books on all subjects. 8 journals and 3 periodicals are available on sciences and social sciences in the reading room. 4 printed daily newspapers and 15 e-news papers are also available. 6 LCD projectors and 4 smart Boards are available in the classrooms, seminar hall, conference hall and departments for use. Well-equipped science laboratories and computer laboratories with 87 computers are available for departments and offices to access.

# **Research and Development**

The College encouraged faculty members for research activity which resulted in publication of 135 papers, publication of 58 books and book chapters during the period 2018-19 to 2022-23. 6 faculty members are pursuing Ph.D. work and one collaborative research work is also underway. ...papers were presented in seminars. Four of our faculty members also guide Ph.D. students. Ph.D. guides are guiding 17 students during the period 2018-19 to 2022-23.

# **Decentralised Participatory Management**

The college has a decentralized and participatory managed organizational structure. The Governing Body is the highest authoritative body under the leadership of the President to lay down important principles and policies. The Principal of the college executes the principles and policies laid down by the Governing Body as chief executive officer. Departmental and Sectional Heads work for the accomplishment of their departmental and sectional objectives. The Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC) works as a staff function ensuring quality teaching-learning and administration. - 1. All types of leave, including maternity leave and child care leave, are permitted as per university statutes and government regulations. Leave accounts are carefully maintained to ensure that no staff member faces any inconvenience during or after their employment.
- 2. Suri Vidyasagar College Employees' Co-operative Credit Society provides loans to its teaching and non teaching staff for various purposes as and when needed. Total amount of loan may be availed by a member of the society is around Rupees five lakh. Teachers can also avail loans from the Provident Fund as per government rules for their financial requirement.
- 3. General Provident Fund facility is ensured to all teaching and non-teaching staff through the government treasury as per government rules. Pension benefits are efficiently managed, and efforts are made to ensure that pension and gratuity benefits are disbursed to retired employees as quickly as possible
- 4. Desktop facilities with internet connectivity are available in the Teachers' Staff Room and Library.
- 5. Clean drinking water and canteen facilities are provided for their use.
- 6. Indoor game facilities are also available for the staffs in their leisure time
- 9. An annual picnic is organised every year.

# Career development/Progression

- 1.The College regularly allows on-duty leave to faculty members to attend Orientation Programme, Refresher Course and short term courses for their career development.
- 2. The college also encourages teachers by giving on-duty leave to attend and present their research papers in seminar/webinar conferences for their academic excellence.

# 6.4 Financial Management and Resource Mobilization

## **Mobilization of Funds**

Funding of the college is obtained from grants received from UGC, Department of Higher Education, Government of West Bengal and RUSA etc. Additionally, funds are collected from students' fees, self-financing courses, and rent received from college buildings used by bank and post-office. Research grants from UGC, ICSSR etc. also contribute to the funds.

# **Utilization of funds**

Funds are optimally utilized for new academic and infrastructural facilities as well as for maintaining existing facilities. The utilization of funds is closely monitored by the Planning Committee, Development Committee, Finance Committee, General Purchase Committee, Building Committee, Laboratory

Equipment Purchase Committee and Auction Committee in order to minimize the cost of acquisition/installation. All transactions are supported by vouchers and bills, processed by the accounts department, and authenticated by the Bursar and Principal. Collections are deposited in the banks and expenditures are incurred through checks.

## Financial audit

The college conducts internal and external audits regularly of its accounts. The external audit is conducted by a statutory auditor every 2 years and the auditors are appointed by the DPI, Education Directorate of Government of West Bengal. The yearly audit reports are submitted to the DPI. External audits have been conducted up to the financial year 2018-19. On the other hand internal audits have been conducted by the CA firm upto 2022-23 and are ready for statutory government audit. The college strictly adheres to all the required accounting principles and guidelines for preparing accounts and presents an annual audit report regularly. Internal audits are also conducted occasionally for utilization/justification of various funds.

- 4.IQAC regularly meets with teachers for proper record-keeping of academic activities, student attendance, internal assessments, student progression, and student mentoring at individual, departmental, and institutional levels.
- 5.IQAC collects and records data on teachers' participation in various academic and professional activities such as engagement in BOS, fieldwork/projects, and other significant engagements.
- 6.During the last five years, IQAC has introduced 2 Add-on courses with the aim of enhancement of life-skill development for enriching students as well as teachers.
- 7. IQAC promotes collaborative activities (MOU's) with HEIs, private companies, NGOs, totaling more than 20 initiatives.
- 8. IQAC encourages teachers to conduct research work.
- 9. IQAC gathers comprehensive data on admission, semester results, field surveys/projects, use of ICTs, and seminars/workshops organized at regular intervals.
- 10. IQAC organized 13 Seminar/Webinar/ Workshops including 9 in collaboartion with various Departments of the college and other institutes.
- 11. It acquires self-appraisal reports from teachers every year for assessing their academic and cocurricular activity performances. Suri Vidyasagar College has constantly tried to devise initiatives to promote gender equality and consistently adopted sufficient safety measures so that girl students face no obstacles in the campus and may comfortably and confidently perform all curricular and co-curricular activities. The focus has been upon promoting holistic development so that physical, emotional and social development may take place simultaneously. For this the following measures have been adopted:

- 1. CCTV cameras installed for constant vigilance, detection and prevention of undesirable activities on campus.
- 2. Provision of girls common room with sufficient furniture, water cooler, toilets, sanitary napkin vending machine etc.
- 3. Establishment of Grievance Redressal Cell.
- 4. Promoting awareness about women's rights, sexual harassment and legal redressal etc. through curriculum (papers like Gender Studies, Feminist Studies etc.) and classroom lectures.
- 5. Awareness regarding Vishaka guidelines and PoSH act 2013.

It is important to note that girl students have consistently outnumbered boys in the period under consideration and therefore have succeeded in bringing to reality the vision of Pandit Ishwar Chandra Vidyasagar, the pioneer of women's education in Bengal and after whom this college is named.

Some of the major activities that this college performs on a regular basis regarding promotion of gender sensitisation and equality are as follows

- 1. Raksha Bandhan is observed by the Department of Bengali, NSS and NCC units every year to promote harmony and goodwill among all students
- 2. Thalassemia and AIDS awareness camps are held by NSS and NCC units to promote consciousness and awareness in collaboration with Red Ribbon Club. Dr. Abir Kumar Pal, M.O. of PDCL, Sagardighi Branch was present as speaker.

# **Response:**

SuriVidyasagar College has always endeavoured to create an inclusive environment for imparting proper education and character development to all students coming from various social, linguistic, economic and religious segments. ### **BEST PRACTICE - 1**

Title of the Practice: Annual Students Seminar

Suri Vidyasagar College holds an Annual Students Seminar for all students of the undergraduate level every year. During the Covid-19 related lockdown this program was organised in the online mode to give students hope and learning during very challenging times.

Objectives of the Practice - The objectives of this practice is to inculcate in students a critical and

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analytic bent of mind and create an instinctive attitude towards research and independent thought. This practiceaims to provide the necessary confidence and aptitude necessary for speaking on the public stage and create an atmosphere of healthy competition.

The Context:Suri Vidyasagar College has always recognized the need to listen to the learner and inculcate the ability of independent thinking. Also desirable is creating a certain curiosity and a willingness in the learner to find out new things for oneself and for others. The seed for research is to be implanted in the minds of the students. The student seminar of this institution begin in the early 2000s and though initially confined to students and faculty of the science departments it gradually enlarged its scope to involve Arts, Commerce and General stream students.

The Practice: Every year the annual student seminar is held over 2 days. Generally one student per department for honours subjects and one per stream for the general course subjects is selected. Usually the Departments select the concerned student after an audition or departmental seminar who then prepares the topic with some guidance and encouragement of the teachers. Each student is usually required to speak for about 8 to 10 minutes and questions are invited after the presentation is over. Use of any audio visual aids or a PPTis encouraged. The speakers receive a certificate as a mark of appreciation and encouragement. The program is generally held in the seminar hall located in the AurobindoBhaban of the college.

**Evidence of success:** This program has helped students to get rid of initialshyness, reluctance and stage fear and also encouraged them for analytic thinking. It has allowed students to not only excel in academics but also shine in extempore programs and youth parliament sessions organised every year.

#### **BEST PRACTICE - 2**

### Title of the Practice: Arun Sen Memorial Annual Prize Distribution Ceremony

Suri Vidyasagar College holds the Annual Arun Sen Memorial Prize Distribution Ceremony in order to felicitate the meritorious students and toppers of University examinations and also other co-curricular and extra-curricular activities such as NCC, NSS and sports. Medals, certificates and prizes are awarded to those of exceptional merit or talent through a diverse array of memorial prizes to encourage educational achievement and character building.

**Objectives of the Practice -** This program is held to encourage students to strive for excellence in their respective academic fields as well as in other activities benefiting character development and nation building. All aspects of student life ranging from Academics to Sports and even regularity of attendance are awarded through this program. The programme is named after former Principal Arun Kumar Sen, a pioneer in the establishment of Suri Vidyasagar College in the early stage.

**The Context:** Professor Arun Kumar Sen played an important role in establishing the position of this college in its early days, utilising his remarkable organisational and administrative skills. After his untimely demise on 10th December 1963 while still serving as principal the ArunSen Memorial Fund took final shape in 1982 to

recognise outstanding students every year. The first award ceremony was held on 22nd January 1983.

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Overtime other individuals and institutions have come forward to sponsor other prizes. Currently Arun Sen Memorial Fund (a Foundation since 2008) is offering about 79 prizes in different disciplines.

The Practice – Initially begun as a cricket tournament, the program started taking present shapesince the Arun Sen Memorial Fund was established in 1982. The first award ceremony was held in 1983 to commemorate outstanding students based on their final University examination results and other distinctions of success in respective fields. The program is generally held on a single day and is preceded by a short cultural program. Traditionally dignitaries are invited to grace the stage and talk about the life and works of Professor Sen. Thereafter students are called on stage to collect the prizes in the form of medals, mementos or book prizes one by one. The name of the donor, the name of the recipient and the category of the prize are announced from stage. Prizes range from various academic distinctions to onfield sports performances and even success in NCC and NSS works. Even other aspects of academic life such as regularity of attendance or cultural consciousness are awarded through this program. It is noteworthy that many former recipients have achieved tremendous prominence and are today well-established in their respective fields. Thus it may be said that this program has encouraged excellence through generations of students.

**Evidence of success:** This program is looked forward to by all teachers and students alike. Students gatherin large numbers to celebrate the success of their peers and also to find enthusiasm for their own future performance. It is noteworthy that many former recipients have achieved tremendous prominence and are today well-established in their respective fields.

A perusal of the prize-winners' list side by side with the list of important alumni will show how this program has identified and fostered significant talent from a nascent stage.

### **Response:**

#### **Institutional Distinctiveness:**

The need for establishing college in Suri was felt as early as 1934 and although some initial efforts were made they did not really become fruitful. Again in 1940 the demand for a college became strong but the ferocity of the Second World War did not allow much concentration of effort. Meanwhile the bombing of

Kolkata by the Japanese forces led to a massive exodus of educational institutions. The Vidyasagar College of Kolkata decided to move campus to Suri in order to escape bombing. Thus a dream became true and a college was born in Suri and started functioning from 9th March 1942. When the Vidyasagar College of Kolkata returned to its original campus SuriVidyasagar College remained as a branch organization till 1948 when it became an independent college of its own.

The district of Birbhum is located in a part of southern West Bengal which is popularly called in local parlance as "Rarh" Bengal. This area though abundant in talent was viewed as educationally backward and necessiated the establishment of quality Institutions of Higher Education that would lead to a holistic development of all connected with it. Thus the declared goals of this college are "Gyan" that is wisdom, "tyag" that is sacrifice and "seva" that is social service. The missions of this college deduced from these may be said to be

- 1) Imparting higher education
- 2) Development of personality and
- 3) Raising socio-cultural awareness.

With these objectives in view SuriVidyasagar College began its journey to create for itself a new distinctive identity.

Since its inception the college has tried to facilitate its students to develop according to their talent, aptitude and ability. Blest with a large campus(with around 40% a natural green zone) this institution has striven for the best blossoming of human talent in proximity with natural bounty. Since its earliest days it has assumed the role of a lead institution that is dedicated to the service of nation and society in all its aspects. This college also considers itself fortunate to be blessed with students of exceptional merit and quality destined to shine in their chosen paths of life, be it the world of education or sports or even social service and national life. Perhaps the most illustrious alumini of this college has been Shri Pranab Mukherjee, 13th President of the Republic of India and awarded Bharat Ratna in 2019. Also important is Shri TulsiGiri, former Prime Minister of Nepal.

Among educationists mention must be made of Padmashree Professor Ramaranjan Mukhopadhyay, former chancellor, Tirupati Rashtriya Sanskrit Vidyapeeth and also Vice Chancellor of Bardhaman University, the renowned educationistProfessor Debranjan Mukhopadhyay, Professor K N Chatterjee, vice chancellor North Bengal University and professor Lakshmi Narayan Mondal, former principal of this college and later Vice Chancellor of Seacom Skills University. Mention must be made of Professor Amitabh Ghosh, ex- director IIT Kharagpur, professor AmalMukhopadhyay, former principal, Presidency College Kolkata, Prof Amal Kumar Mandal of the Dept of Botany and Forestry, Vidyasagar University and DrGautam Chandra, Professor, Department of Zoology and currently vice chancellor of University of Bardhaman.

In the world of sports this college is proud to have Shri PK Banerjee renowned footballer as part of its alumni and and also Rajesh Oraon former NCC cadet and soldier of Indian Army martyred in the clash with China at Ladakh. The culture of excellence continues with illustrious individuals such as DrSushanto Kumar Banerjee, Professor of Pathology and Laboratory Medicine at University of Kansas Medical Centre, Kansas City; Professor Deba Prasad Chattopadhyay, Director ICMR-NITM Karnataka, and Nandan Kumar Mondal of Baylor College of Medicine. This list is just the tip of the Iceberg of

illustrious students who have at some point of time been connected with this institution.

This college recognises that past success cannot be rested on in an atmosphere of stagnation and therefore it constantly envisages finding, trying out and adopting new practices that may add further to its distinctive identity. Therefore this college has already experimented with the open book system in terminal examination at the undergraduate level and also takes a base level test to understand the preparedness of incoming students before starting a course. Also established is a Drama Club which today runs a certificate course in Drama that is affiliated to the University of Bardhaman. Wall Magazines are regularly published by all departments and annual science exhibition is held every year. The career counselling and placement cell is kept active and this college has collaborated with TCS, Mahindra and others for enhancing employability or providing job opportunities of its students. Thus SuriVidyasagar College believes in getting human resource ready for the future challenges by taking strength from past achievements and being aware of present -day reality.

Overtime mainly professors of this college, their families and wellwishers have sponsored various prizes in the memory of their loved ones. Currently Arun Sen Memorial Fund, that has became a Foundation in 2008, is offering about 79 prizes in diverse disciplines acknowledging excellence in various fields.

### **Concluding Remarks:**

The college firmly believes in its motto of providing the best undergraduate education that is holistic in nature and looks after the physical, moral and intellectual growth of the learner.
